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# Introduction

The past 18 months have been a period of intense activity at St Augustine's after the trials of lockdown. Our main focus has been on the Roof Renovation Project which has seen the renewal of five of our roofs and restoration work in St John's chapel. The North Cloister roof, in particular, was in a parlous state with tiles falling onto the pavement outside. Thankfully this is now all behind us thanks to a £272k grant from the Catholic Bishop's Conference of England and Wales (ultimately a Covid Recovery Grant from Historic England) and £68k which we managed to raise in match funding (see the finance report for details). Thanks is due to all our generous donors and to the Archdiocese of Southwark which supported us throughout, not least by acting as our guarantor.

We have also been busy welcoming visitors. Group and organised pilgrimage numbers are back up to previous levels (see the "Year of Activity and Progress") and we had well attended St Augustine's and Pugin Week activities. Individual visitor numbers are running at 4.5k which is about half what they were before Covid. However, by improving the quality of our tours we have managed to keep donations at a healthy level.

One of the strengths of St Augustine's is the variety of groups that love and support it. This includes the Old Augustinian's (who have donated their school archive to us), the Latin Mass Society, the Ordinariate, Pugin Society, Choral Scholars and Pilgrims as well as the parishioners who form the backbone of our volunteers. Local schools and students are also frequent visitors.

2021 was the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of St Augustine's as a Shrine. Archbishop John Wilson celebrated Mass with us on the 12<sup>th</sup> October. Old boy, Alastair Stewart delivered one of the readings and the Mayor, Raushan Ara and other dignitaries joined us for a very joyous occasion. Many people who attended said it was just like the old days!

None of this activity would be possible without our wonderful volunteers who keep the Shrine open on a daily basis. Special mention should go to Artur, for preparing the throne for the Archbishop and Jim, who generously gilded the tabernacle at no charge. Since Covid we are somewhat reduced in number so could always do with help; in particular, if anyone has the enthusiasm to take on a management role that would help enormously. We need help with the shop, book-keeping, event organising, pilgrimages, schools and the web.

So, what does the future hold? Well, the next step in our renovation program will be a quinquennial survey to determine priorities. As usual we will be holding busy St Augustine's and Pugin Weeks including the return of the Blessing of the Sea on Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> May at 2pm (keep an eye on the website for details). 2023 also promises to be a bumper year for pilgrimage. Why not join us?

### Finances 2022

From a finance point of view 2022 was dominated by the Roof Renovation Project. We were set a match funding target of £68k to add to the £272k we had been granted by the Catholic Bishop's Conference of England and Wales (ultimately from the Historic England, Culture Recovery Grant). We reached our target through a mixture of grants (£10k from the Lottery Community Fund, £10k from the Benefact Trust), individual donations (£33,869) and our own funds (£15k). Note £13,450 of this was raised in 2021. This was an incredibly encouraging result showing the breadth of support for St Augustine's. Thanks to all our generous benefactors.


2022 also saw the development of our shop. Neal Smith, one of our volunteers, organised the production of biscuits and confectionary in Pugin design boxes. These have been a great success and are making a material difference to our finances. Neal is moving away and will be missed.


Also in 2022, we completed the purchase of music for the choir and a set of hymn books. Sadly Ben, our Director of Music, is also leaving. He has been a core part of the community at St Augustine's and will be hard to replace. We wish him luck in his new role in Canterbury.

Finally, there was the more bread and butter side of the operation. We replaced the two decrepit laptops in the office and bought a scaffold tower which has allowed us to do basic maintenance tasks at height.

Overall the shrine finances are in good shape with a current balance of £25k compared to £30k before the project. We propose to conduct a quinquennial survey to determine priorities for next steps.



that was the COVID Pandemic, and indeed of conservators have made a real difference. to remember those lost years, we can look back at some unexpected silver linings.

At St Augustine's one such lining appeared in the form of the COVID Recovery grant programme which made grants available, under tight and competitive conditions for projects where, in our case, historic buildings had been affected by COVID restrictions.

Grants are the lifeblood of securing our historic buildings where the cost of maintaining these venerable structures is By Paul Sharrock beyond the means of the worshipping Thomas Ford and Partners congregation and supporters. However, they are very competitive and often released at short notice with various strings attached. The Recovery grant stream was no exception.

The Catholic church centrally was quick to see the possibilities across the country and aided by Andrew Kelly at St Augustine's a successful application was made for the most urgent repairs at Ramsgate. However, the string to the grant, which on occasion felt more like a noose, was that having given the grant in November 2022, the bulk of the monies had to be spent by the end of March 2023. Contractors and specialists were in great demand. We were fortunate in having Colman Construction on board- they had built the Visitor Centre.

As ever, St Augustine's revealed more secrets as we addressed problems with the roofs over the St John's Chapel and the Bell Tower.

It was not only an opportunity to address vital repairs but also to carry out conservation cleaning to St John's Chapel and to find the earlier colour schemes which are now on

#### The Society of Old Augustinians


Over 50 years has passed since St Augustine's College moved from Ramsgate to Westgate, but still many of us return to what was our original home in St Augustine's church.

When the school opened in 1865, the first lessons took place inside what is now the visitor's centre of St Augustine' church. All school masses were held at the church until Peter Paul Pugin, a former Old Augustinian, designed and built a school chapel in in the grounds of the Abbey. For those of us at the school in the 60's until it closed, St Augustine's church was used for special school masses. For the older generation of Old Augustinians, St Augustine's church is very much a spiritual home and probably the place where we have our strongest connection with our old school.

Old Augustinians have been delighted to play our small part in supporting St Augustine's church over the years, which now houses our new War Memorial and our Old Augustinians Archive. Our school may no longer exists, but every year, we hold our annual Remembrance Mass in St Augustine's church to remember not only those who gave their lives in the two world wars, but to remember the monks, our teachers and all those Old Augustinians who have passed on in the last year. Many Old Boys, former teachers and parents are buried in the graveyard too and their graves are blessed annually.

In recent years we have invited students from the Ursuline College, our successor school, as well as Civic Leaders, to be part of this heritage. Many of us visit during the year in addition to our annual Remembrance Service. We look forward to giving our continued support and we are planning to hold an exhibition in the church and will let you know when.

#### The Ramsgate Ordinariate Group

The Personal Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham was created by the late Pope Emeritus Benedict in 2011 for groups of Anglicans wishing to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church. The position of the Catholic Church is that Christians from the Protestant traditions are in partial communion with her by virtue of their baptism. In order to be in full communion, however, lay people must receive confirmation and priests must be ordained by a Catholic bishop after their confirmation.

Here at St Augustine's, there is an Ordinariate group of eight members plus me as the Ordinariate priest. We meet for Mass in the Shrine at 5pm every Sunday using the Ordinariate missal entitled Divine Worship which includes prayers from the Book of Common Prayer. Pope Benedict wanted the Ordinariate to bring this Anglican heritage into the Catholic Church. He also intended that the Ordinariate should enrich the Catholic musical tradition with Anglican chant and hymnody. This we do at St Augustine's through the dedication and skill of our organist and cantor, Mr. Edmund Hampton.

Although we are a small group, we are regularly joined for Mass by diocesan Catholics and members of the Divine Retreat community from the former abbey. Visitors seem to appreciate the reverent atmosphere produced by the traditional language and ceremonies of this way of celebrating the Mass.

It is very appropriate that the Ordinariate Mass is offered in Pugin's 'personal church'

because he was himself an Anglican until 1835 and had many Anglican friends throughout his life. One of his dearest wishes was to see Anglicans reunited with the Rome from which St Augustine brought the Christian faith. Indeed he saw Gothic ecclesiastical art and architecture, at least in part, as his contribution to securing that end. That aspiration has now been realised in the Ordinariate and I am sure he would rejoice.

#### Music Report 2022/2023

Over the last sixteen months the music at the Shrine of St. Augustine has firmly recovered from the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic and we have re-established weekly rehearsals with a steady membership of all ages and abilities. Along with the regular Sunday Masses, we have provided music for all Holy Days of Obligation and additional services at both St. Augustine's and St. Ethelbert's utilising our choir and organists. The organs at both churches are in the care of Scott & Fern Pipe Organ Maintenance which has proved very useful during the recent roof and heating repairs. Through the newly established generous support of the Shrine, with thanks to Andrew Kelly, we have completed the Music Library, revised and expanded congregational and clergy resources, and established a routine of volunteered help to ensure their distribution. Our concerts in St. Augustine's week and Pugin week continue to be of immensy high guality with all participation being from home-grown local musicians. We have also been happy to provide help to St. Ethelbert's and to St. Thomas's Canterbury on a regular basis. In short, it has been a busy sixteen months!

We continue to provide the choir and organ music at the regular Sunday twelve-noon Mass comprising of Gregorian Chant, organ repertoire & improvision and Latin choral works from the fourteenth century onwards. For Feasts and Holy Days of Obligation we deploy an expanded and extensively rehearsed choir delivering more solemn repertoire appropriate to the occasion, resources, and liturgy. Upon request we have delivered professional musicianship to services including First Holy Communions, Confirmations, Weddings, and Funerals. We have also been training choir members to ring the tower bell on a rotary basis.

#### We are lucky to have Edmund Hampton leading the provision of music for Mass celebrated according to the Ordinariate Use. Since February 2022 we have established and developed a fully sung Mass with cantor and organ. It is our intention to maintain support for this and expand it, with the support of Fr. Simon.

We are blessed to have two excellent acoustics and two of the best-kept and fullyfunctioning organs in Thanet within our Parish. The organ at St. Augustine's required protection from the effects of work carried out on the roof. Since then it has been further complicated by the issues of lack of heating and therefore damp conditions. As a result of this, further to the two full tunings per year, we have undertaken a myriad of repairs and modifications to the instrument. These include keyspring and depth adjustment, the swell pedal requiring a new component and bushing, the stop jamb being modified to accommodate adjustment to the keys, and malfunctioning stops being attended to due to the damp. Upstairs in the chamber there have been several split wooden pipes which required re-glueing, several reed pipes in need of cleaning and re-setting, and three pipes that have been sent away for further repairs. Further work is required to ensure the organ's longevity. This is in the nature of a new blower and the addition of concussion bellows as well as voicing the heavy lead facade pipes. The organ will require cleaning in fifteen years. The organ at St. Ethelbert's is, in my humble opinion, the finest parish church organ in the area. It is in the best condition it has ever been in and once heating was restored enabled an incredibly stable tuning just in time for Christmas. We have re-shaped the case

#### Some thoughts on the Pugin Society

I am very pleased, as a long standing member of the Pugin Society (founded 1995) Committee, to have the opportunity of writing a few words in the Friends Newsletter, stressing the Society's ongoing support of the activities of the Friends, which are absolutely essential to the future of Pugin's outstanding church in Ramsgate.

The Pugin Society shares its contacts with the Friends, with whom it works closely, as for example by assisting in finding speakers for the Friends' annual Pugin Week in September. Various Pugin Society members are also volunteers and guides in St Augustine's. Perhaps also, by covering a wider range of Pugin activities and news, the Society helps to create links between St Augustine's and the Pugin world beyond Ramsgate, links which can become part of the background of knowledge needed by volunteer guides to show off St Augustine's church to our many visitors. Sharing information is so important. We also offer the Friends publicity on our Events sheets and on the Society Facebook and Twitter pages when appropriate.

The Society organised a very successful tour in Ramsgate last July, led by Jayne Evelyn, in which the church (naturally) played a very significant role, with excellent input, as guide, from Andrew Kelly, the Visitor Centre Manager. In all ways, we in the Pugin Society want to promote St Augustine's and its splendid Visitor Centre.

When planning took place in 2015 for the future organisation and running of what was to become the St Augustine's Education, Research and Visitor Centre, with funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF), and with their guidance and support, one

stipulation was that there should be an archive and library. The HLF rightly felt that any Visitor Centre embracing the words 'Education' and 'Research' in its title should be able to provide items to further these ends. Part of my role as a member of the St Augustine's Project Management Board, as it was named, was to assemble archival material. Largely because of the Pugin Society's contacts, this was made possible by generous donations from various leading Pugin scholars. Later on, further purchases were made and now the archive and books have been catalogued, and a description of their overall content, but not the catalogue itself, can be found on www.augustinepugin.org.uk, under 'Collections'. Last year a Society member located a Pugin Travelling Scholarship medal of 1871, awarded to architect George Washington Brown, on



e-bay, and this became an exciting new acquisition for us. It is challenging to build an archive from scratch, but we hope that what has now

been assembled will be of interest. Currently a new display is being put together, supervised by a Pugin Society member and St Augustine's volunteer. As with all such projects, not only will the public benefit from them, but also those people engaged in setting them up. It is a learning curve for all, and we very much hope that soon interested parties will be able to look at and learn from our archives, books, and displays. Here's hoping for a very successful 2023 and let **En Avant - Forward!** - Pugin's motto, be our aim at all times.

#### The Archbishop's Visit


